Completed Projects

- March was a very busy month full of programs, school visits, and summer program preparations!
- We hosted weekly story times for children ages 0-6. Our Wednesday story time is for ages birth-2 years, while our Friday story time is for ages 3-6.
- For Lego Club, kids built "an island they would like to be stranded on". We had a racecar island, lava island, magical forest island, and a swimming pool island. I don't know if I'd like to be trapped on any of those islands, but the kids were very excited about their creations!
- Our furry friends from the Tail Waggin' Tutors visited. The dogs are always a hit, and our patrons love spending time with them!
- Lawrence Greene taught an African Drum class for kids. This program has been a hit each month and fills up quickly. If there is room in our budget, I hope to invite Lawrence back next school year.
- The Choose Your Own Adventure Book Club had its monthly meeting. We read "The Warlock and the Unicorn" and the kids got to make their own magic wands. The kids got really invested in the story. It was a great time!
- We hosted STEAM story time for ages 5-8. The kids learned about constellations and made their own star projectors.
- We hosted a Saturday craft day where kids came to make a variety of spring flower crafts. Our
 passive Saturday events continue to bring in lots of families. We hope to include more programs
 like this next school year.

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- I visited three schools this month through our partnership with Wood County Schools. This
 program has allowed us to visit schools every month and has resulted in new families coming to
 the library.
- We hosted an Easter scavenger hunt throughout spring break week. We had 75 kids come in to participate in this event!

Ongoing Projects

- Researching and ordering books for our children's collection.
- Displaying books throughout the room to keep children interested in new series/subjects.
- Creating passive activities for families to enjoy when they visit the library.
- Creating a monthly calendar to advertise our events for children ages 13 and under.
- Creating graphics for social media to highlight our upcoming events.
- Reading each week with a kindergarten and two first-grade classes at Criss Elementary School.
- Preparing for our upcoming Summer Library Club. I ordered most of our supplies in February, so
 now we are prepping activities for each week of the summer program. Some of our most
 outlandish tasks have included cutting out 500 superhero capes, making 500 pairs of binoculars,
 and even making Harry Potter wands. It's lots of work, but loads of fun!

March was a big planning month, for summer reading and future programs.

- D&D continues! We play twice a month, and the kids are doing great. They've obtained some new pets (rats, spiders), interesting items (mushrooms, magic potions of dubious quality) and some shocking revelations.

- Teen Hangout has been replaced by a Board Game Night. I may rotate between the two styles of programs to try to appeal to a wider group of kids. We played Munchkin: Warhammer 40000, a cutthroat and silly game, and Taco Cat Goat Cheese Pizza, which is also silly and cutthroat but with aggressive table smacking.
- The middle graders are continuing with their simplified game. They enjoy it, and it makes the game easier for everyone involved.
- Making graphics and a monthly calendar to advertise YA events.
- Colleen and I have begun slowly weeding the main YA collection.
- I am researching and ordering books for the YA collection.
- YA Summer Reading is planned, and we have begun to order supplies.

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- Kelsey has been supervising a few teens who come into the library for a work placement program. They have cut lots of bookmarks, located some missing books, and other various and sundry activities.
- Kelsey and I have been working on a new game for the teens to play in the fall. It will feature fewer dice rolls and more spaceships. It's now in playtesting, and I am looking for guinea pigs.
- Looking forward -- considering the size of the middle grade bridge programs, we're going to
 have to rethink how we do programming specifically how we schedule the TTRPG programs to
 retain those kids effectively. I'd also like to be able to do outreach more consistently but will
 also need to restructure programs so we can have space for more kids. I want to grow the
 program, but how that's going to work is yet to be determined.

All data would now be merged daily like "all" other Library servers (which is the huge project I have been undertaking this winter) and no more patrons asking why they are getting "__ book again," unless they specifically ask for it! Whew! It's a lot! But it can be done – and very, very soon!

Began a VERY rough draft of a Newsletter for Talking Books (Renamed "Insights") in February –
tossed out the original idea and walked away from it for most of the month to finish other
projects, collect new vision, and gather ideas.

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- Waiting for scheduling verification for a radio interview with Oliver Araiza and WVGV 89.7FM a
 Christian radio station in West Union (Doddridge County) to reach the outlying areas of the rural
 populous that I cannot reach on my own. Mr. Araiza is required by the FCC to provide his listeners
 with a minimum of 8 hours of Public Service Announcements per month. This PSA would serve both
 Mr. Araiza with a satisfactory PSA time, and I can reach rural areas I could never reach other than
 through an Every Door Mass Mailing.
