- Evening With Lori Hostettler- Director of WV History and Regional Center at WVU presented women of history in WV for 3 attendees. She would like to return and would be willing to host a field trip for anyone at the library interested in seeing their collections.
- Rachel Dickel held an interesting class on snack swaps and nutritional eating for 5 people.
- Freestyle Diorama for Adult Craft class with 6 in attendance
- Displays- Historical Fiction featuring Women, Random Readers Women, Hot Button Issues Women, Women Authors: (Guess The Theme) Staff Picks, Graphic Selections
- Planning for Summer Reading Program is almost complete, with the 3 big headliners booked and paid for. We will be featuring Steve Ball and Music of the Civil War in May, Mark Twain later years in June, and Harriet Tubman Part 2 in July. Additional events surrounding Bigfoot are planned in May.

### **Completed Projects**

- We hosted story times for ages 0-2 and 3-5 each week. Our 0-2 story time is still our most popular story time averaging 50 people a week!
- We partnered with Discovery World to host an event at the library. It was a busy event where kids got to make paper airplanes and launch them. It was a blast!
- We held our monthly Lego club. This month the Lego challenge was to build a dinosaur adventure! Our new format for Lego Club has been successful and we have seen many new faces because of the change.
- Our friends from the Tail Waggin' Tutors visited us to read with some of our library kids. This program allows reluctant readers to practice reading with a therapy dog.
- This month's scavenger hunt was about children's authors for Read Across America week. When kids completed the scavenger hunt, they got a journal and pen to write their own stories!
- For our Library World Travelers event, we learned about Australia. Kids made their own aboriginal art, boomerangs, and even got to try an Australian snack called Tim Tams.
- Lawrence Green visited us to host our last African Drum Class of the school year.
- During Choose Your Own Adventure Book Club, we read *Time Travel Inn* aloud as a group. In the story, we ended up getting stuck in another time period. After reading the story, the kids got to make their own time capsules that they can open when they graduate high school.
- For our monthly Saturday event, we invited kids to make dinosaur crafts. We had about 60 people visit us on Saturday and more visited us the next week.
- We collaborated with Criss School for their One School One Book program. Kids visited the library to tell us about their book and receive tickets that they redeemed at school for prizes.
- I met with MJ from the Watering Can Art Studio to plan a special ceramic painting event for this summer.
- I met with members of the Board of Education and Spartan Foundation to discuss the Golden Ticket program for this coming summer. We are excited to continue this collaboration with Wood County Schools.

### **Ongoing Projects**

- Researching and ordering books for our children's collection.
- Displaying books throughout the room to keep children interested in new series/subjects.
- Creating a monthly calendar to advertise our events for children ages 12 and under.
- Creating graphics for social media to highlight our upcoming events.
- Relabeling and organizing the children's chapter book collection. We have already received compliments from patrons appreciating the new labels and how much easier it is to find books in a series.
- Read aloud to classes at Criss and Madison schools each week.
- We are starting to prep activities for the Summer Library Club. We are preparing for approximately 500 kids a week! Each week, we will have an art-related activity for kids to complete.
- We are also working on our summer giveaway book order. We received a generous grant from the Henry Logan Foundation that we will use to purchase these books.

### **Completed Projects**

- Middle Grade Camp Half-Blood covered chapters 9-14 in the book *The Sea of Monsters* by Rick Riordan. We discussed what we had read that month as a group. After reviewing those chapters, we played a game on Kahoot to test our knowledge. Kids made buttons that went along with the chapters and theme.
- We hosted an escape room called The *Werewolf Experiment,* where they had to work together as a team to beat the clock before being transformed into werewolves. They did a great job and completed the escape room before their time limit was up!
- The theme for our monthly Manga Club was female mangaka. Members of the group shared what they were reading/watching and had a lively discussion.

### **Ongoing Projects**

- Hyperfixation Club for teens continues every Tuesday from 4 to 6pm. The kids enjoy this time getting together, sharing their interests, and work on hobbies. Every other week we have a sensory friendly Hyperfixation Club. Many enjoy these weeks because it caters to the needs of our teens who are easily overwhelmed or prefer quieter gatherings.
- We are in the process of planning our teen summer program. We will have two events each week, with each week having a different theme. We will be able to host 40 kids a week for these programs. Teens will also earn books as a reward for attending our events.
- Each month we put out a calendar to showcase events we have for our teen patrons.
- We also make graphics to showcase our events on Facebook and other social media platforms.
- Kelsey has been planning projects for the teens who come for work placement. The kids are here five days a week, school schedule permitting.
- The Discord server has been popular with teens. They share their art, lift each other up and communicate when they can't make it to programs. We hope to explore ways to use this resource to encourage engagement with the library.
