### **YOUNG READER'S ROOM** – Charley J.

## **Completed Projects**

- We hosted story times for ages 0-2 and 3-5 each week. Our 0-2 story time has 2 meeting times, and we are excited to see the 9am session growing to about 20 people. The 10:30am session continues to have 35-40 people each week.
- We held our monthly Lego club. This month, the Lego challenge was to build a space adventure!
   Our new format for Lego Club has been successful and we have seen many new faces because of the change.
- Our friends from the Tail Waggin' Tutors visited us to read with some of our library kids. This program allows reluctant readers to practice reading with a therapy dog.
- This month's scavenger hunt was about mythological creatures. Kids ventured around the room and learned about some of our favorite mythological creatures. When they finished the hunt, they received a prize including small gifts from each of the creatures they learned about. We had 90 children complete the scavenger hunt.
- During Choose Your Own Adventure Book Club, we read *Big Foot's Vacation* aloud as a group. In the story, we ended up going on vacation to Hawaii with Big Foot. It was hilarious!
- For our monthly Saturday event, we invited kids to decorate birdhouses and garden gnomes. We had approximately 50 kids visit us throughout the day.
- We hosted our 4<sup>th</sup> Annual Stuffed Animal Sleepover! This program is always a blast, and the laughter heard while showing kids pictures of what their stuffed animals did at the library is precious! This year our stuffed friends even ventured to the roof!
- We partnered with MonPower to host a tree planting workshop for children ages 5-12.
   MonPower also came back the next day to pass out trees to the community. We are grateful for their support and our partnership with this event.
- Brian and I attended the quarterly Wood County Reads meeting. This month we discussed the Golden Ticket program, which is a summer reading challenge provided by Wood County Schools. The library partners with Wood County School to help facilitate this program.
- Through a generous donation from the Henry Logan Foundation, I was able to order over 5,000 books for our upcoming summer program. We are so grateful to Henry Logan, as they made it possible for us to give away over 4,600 books last summer! We look forward to seeing how many books we give away this year!
- I was also able to order supplies for our various events taking place this summer. We prepare for 500 children per week, so as you can imagine, we had to order lots of supplies! Now that the supplies are in, we have been prepping activities that will be delivered to the branches at the beginning of June.

#### **Ongoing Projects**

- Researching and ordering books for our children's collection.
- Displaying books throughout the room to keep children interested in new series/subjects.
- Creating a monthly calendar to advertise our events for children aged 12 and under.
- Creating graphics for social media to highlight our upcoming events.
- Relabeling and organizing the children's chapter book collection. We have finished labeling the fantasy chapter book series and are now working on mysteries.
- Becky and Charley read aloud to classes at Criss and Madison schools each week. We love going
  into these schools and making connections with their students and teachers. It gives us a great
  opportunity to promote the library and our services, while generally encouraging students to
  love reading.

### **DEPARTMENT ACTIVITIES – April 2025**

- We are in full summer prep mode in the Young Readers' Room! This summer's theme is art, so we are preparing art activities for each week of our eight-week program. The events for this summer are listed below:
  - Kick off Week- Kids sign up for programs this week and can visit any library branch to do a variety of craft activities
  - Lego Masterpiece Week- Kids get to recreate famous art using Lego blocks
  - Build-A-Monster Week- Kids learn basic hand stitching and make their own silly monsters
  - Masterpiece Scavenger Hunt Week- Kids complete a scavenger hunt in the library to receive a prize
  - Music Makers Week- Kids get to make rain sticks and learn songs using their new instruments
  - Video Game Art Week- Kids can visit any branch throughout the week to do various video game art projects
  - Ceramic Painting Week- Kids get to paint a ceramic cup from the Watering Can Art Studio
  - Dragon Art Week- Kids can visit any branch throughout the week to make dragon eggs and other dragon art
- In addition to preparing for these programs, we are also prepping buttons that will be given as prizes when children check out books. Each time a child checks out, they will receive a book and a button to put on their library backpack. We are making over 5,000 buttons for this summer!

#### **Completed Projects**

- Camp Half-Blood: Mythology 101 Book Club for Middle Grade has been a big hit throughout this school year, consistently having 7 or 8 kids every month! This was our last meeting to wrap up The Sea of Monsters by Rick Riordan. We plan to pick up the third book in the Percy Jackson series in the fall since the kids want to continue. To end this year's final meeting, we made sure to include some extra fun activities. Kelsey did a mythology comparison between the book and the myth about Charybdis and Scylla. Followed by some reading questions that the kids really engaged with and debated their thoughts and opinions. Kelsey designed a claiming game in which they rolled a giant d20 to find out which Greek god or goddess claimed them as their demigod child as if they were all campers at Camp Half-Blood. After they were claimed, they got a certificate, a button, and an informational card about the god or goddess that they rolled. Afterwards, we had a Party Pony Dance Party based on the characters in the book. They each got a plush pony keychain so that they never have to dance alone with a little adoption certificate. We listened to music and gave them glow stick bracelets. The kids danced and played keep up the balloon with their ponies. To wrap up, we gave them a Create your own Mythical beast worksheet that Abagail designed, so they could make a one-of-a-kind Creature that could be found in The Sea of Monsters.
- We hosted a Spring picnic event in the arboretum that had several attendees! Lemonade, special picnic snacks and treats were served before spring and nature themed activities. We designed a nature scavenger hunt, with the goal to walk around the park to collect items that fit the list provided, we encouraged them to find non-animate objects and give them human characteristics, then share their finds and give them a ridiculous backstory. A feather having an

identity crisis, a leaf that looks like it's done with life, a piece of trash that feels important. There were many funny and absurd finds and stories! Afterwards, we had spring inspired crafts, including birdhouse and flowerpot painting. It was a nice change of scenery, and we had several requests to do more outdoor programs.

 The theme for our monthly Manga Club was non-human protagonists. Members of the group shared what they were reading/watching as of late and had lively discussions. Every Month, Kira designs collectable buttons that go along with the theme of the month, which you get if you attend that month's meeting.

### **Ongoing Projects**

- Hyperfixation Club for teens continues every Tuesday from 4 to 6pm. The kids enjoy this time to
  get together, share their interests, and work on hobbies. Every other week we have a sensory
  friendly Hyperfixation Club. Many enjoy these weeks because it caters to the needs of our teens
  who are easily overwhelmed or prefer quieter gatherings. The Young Adult team hopes to focus
  on creating a more inclusive space, and that includes neurodivergent youth. We are working on
  brainstorming more sensory-friendly areas, specialized programs, and tailored support to ensure
  every teen feels welcome and supported with their unique learning and social needs.
- We are in the process of planning our teen summer program! We will have two events each
  week, with each week loosely based on a different creative theme. We will be able to host 40
  kids a week for these programs. The 8 week teen summer lineup is going to be about art and
  creativity, with no reading logs this year, just hands-on fun and participation rewards! Every
  week will have two main programs:

Tuesdays = big creative events

Fridays = chill craft hangouts

Highlights from our lineup:

Week 1: Color Explosion Kickoff Party + Soda tab buddy keychains

Week 2: Character Creation & Cosplay Workshop + DIY Cosplay Amulets

Week 3: Turf War Kobold Endeavour RPG One-Shot + Fantasy Mapmaking

Week 4: Forged in Clay: Mystic Dragons Clay class

Week 5: Messy Art Madness + EcoCrafts

Week 6: Mood Mobs: Monster Makers + Self-Portrait Album Covers

Week 7: Off the Wall: Graffiti-Inspired Art + Collage Coasters

Week 8: Intergalactic-Crafts + Watercolor Nebulas

Teens will get to: Pick out a free book to keep each Tuesday, roll for a prize at those events, and earn entries for grand prizes that we will draw for at the end of the Summer. We aim to focus on creative engagement for this year's Summer Library Club.

- Each month we put out a calendar to showcase events we have for our teen patrons.
- We also make graphics to showcase our events on Facebook and other social media platforms.
- Kelsey has been planning projects for the teens who come for work placement. The kids are here five days a week, school schedule permitting. They have started helping with Summer Library Club preparations!
- The Discord server has been popular with the teens. They share their art, lift each other up and communicate when they aren't able to make it to programs. We hope to explore ways to use this resource to encourage engagement with the library.

### TALKING BOOKS DEPARTMENT - Michal Ann L.

Thank you for taking the time to read this April 2025 Update!

April has been a flurry of activity! April 1st & 3rd were spent in Charleston at the Special Services Library – which is the main hub for all things National Library Service (NLS) related in the state of WV. Seth – the main reference Librarian for the SSL trained me on how to process digital book requests on the Gutenberg machine: a large set of flash drive houses that transfer files very quickly from the server to the cartridges that get mailed out to patrons. I also was trained in how to process out the mail cards for the USPS! Kyle: the main person to input new patrons, showed me in depth how the WebREADS (the NLS server for all things patrons and books – loosely could be compared to the Sierra system in this Library). I spent time with Teresa who oversees all equipment and was able to learn how to fix a couple of small issues with Talking Books players. I was also able to be in and out of a few of the sessions for the WVLA Spring Fling. I was overjoyed to learn that April 3rd, the Regional Director of Patron Engagement was going to be in Charleston at the State Library & the Special Services Library. I was able to spend several hours with MaryBeth Wise and got to relay some of the many things that I have been able to do for our Subregional Talking Books Library here in Parkersburg. The main takeaway from the 16 action-packed, information filled hours was that the Talking Books office here in Parkersburg is key to the outreach of the NLS. The 2 other Subregional Libraries have much less patron engagement and outreach than we do here in Parkersburg. Seth conveyed to me that my work in Parkersburg is only limited to what limits I put on myself: meaning the possibilities and the influence that our Library has on the 8 counties we cover are immeasurable! Charleston has also begun sending me patrons that do not have a Subregional and pass me tasks that they do not have time to accomplish. My volunteer (Ryan Lamb) was able to go to Charleston with me, and the staff there was able to train him in specific ways that he can support the work that we do, and tasks that volunteers do for their office that helps them significantly. In all, the entire trip was very informative and helped fill in the gaps in the training I was lacking. I have been able to specifically help people in the past 2 weeks I normally would have just "passed on to Charleston" to get help.

Including the 2 days that I spent with the lovely folks in Charleston, I travelled to Calhoun Public Library, and on the way back contacted 5 agencies, and was able to tentatively set up a school tour for Talking Books. I spent a lively morning with the Wood County Seniors – where I signed up 6 new patrons! On April 29<sup>th</sup>, I travelled to Sisterville Library (Tyler County) where I was again able to make contact with 4 agencies.
