Completed Projects

- Our Summer Library Club has officially kicked off with great enthusiasm and engagement from the community! By the end of June, we had 830 children registered in the library club. At this point in the summer, we are over 1,000 children with 5 more weeks left in the program! We are excited to see a positive response from the community.
- We have also given away over 2,500 books so far thanks to generous funding from the Henry Logan Foundation.
- We also received a generous donation of new Scholastic books from the organization Greater Purpose. These books will also be given away through the Summer Library Club.
- Before the library club began, I met with librarians from the branches to review our activities for the summer and show them everything we prepared for the events. This gave us a chance to ask any questions and make sure we were on the same page before the program started. I also visited Williamstown on their class days to help out at the events. I've enjoyed getting to know some of our patrons in Williamstown!
- During the first week of the Summer Library Club, kids came in throughout the week to sign up
 for events and do a variety of art projects. We had a table for drawing, clay creation, watercolor
 painting, bracelet making, card making and more. I called it our "craft buffet". It was a blast!
- The next week, we were recreating famous art using Lego bricks. This was a tough challenge, but the kids rose to the occasion and did a phenomenal job! We printed out pictures of famous art for them to use as a guide, and they recreated that art with Lego bricks. I highly recommend visiting the back of our room by the Lego wall to see pictures of our library kids and their creations!
- The last week of June brought monsters into the library. Have no fear, they were of the felt and fluff variety... Kids learned to sew a basic stitch and used that stitch to make their very own monster buddy. It has been sweet watching kids bring their monsters on various adventures. One kid even decided to take his monster with him to the beach! This program allowed us to teach kids useful skills while still having fun!
- We also hosted story times for ages birth-2 years old and ages 3-5 years old. We always look
 forward to story time and have enjoyed seeing some new faces throughout the summer. In
 story time, we sing, dance, play and read together! We try to take the activities we are doing
 with the older children and do something similar for the younger children.
- At the end of the month, we were given the opportunity to partner with local high school students to paint our new playhouse located in the play area. They came in on a Saturday evening and Sunday to paint the house. They did not have a chance to finish, but it is already looking amazing! They plan to come back to add more details and paint more inside the house.

Ongoing Projects

• Managing our Summer Library Club is an ongoing task that takes up much of our time in the summer. When kids check out a book, we check off their visit for the day and give them a prize.

Each time kids check out, they get to pick a free book from our cart. They also get a token to our vending machine and get a button for their library backpack. Kids love the vending machine! This act of checking kids out and giving out prizes takes up much of our time. We typically have lines of kids waiting to check out on our busiest days!

- We are also partnering with Wood County Schools for their annual Golden Ticket Program.
 Wood County students come into the library to find books to read on their reading lists. We help them find books and when they finish reading them, we also give them tickets. Kids can then take those tickets to a WCS book fair where they get free books for completing their reading lists.
- Researching and ordering books for our children's collection.
- Displaying books throughout the room to keep children interested in new series/subjects.
- Creating a monthly calendar to advertise our events for children aged 12 and under.
- Creating graphics for social media to highlight our upcoming events.
- Relabeling and organizing the children's chapter book collection.

Completed Projects

- Teen Summer Library Club *Color Our World* launched spectacularly with our Color Explosion Kickoff Party with **72** people in attendance! Everyone that attended the event was given a goodie bag, a free book thanks to the Henry Logan Foundation, and could enter to win one of the four grand prizes that we will draw for at the end of summer. They will also have a chance to win more entries throughout the summer at each program. We were able to highlight all the fun programs and activities coming up and introduce how the incentive prize program will work this year. There was a lot of interest in these programs; most sign-ups for the upcoming events were completely filled with many waiting lists by the end of the night! Thanks to the generosity and collaboration of Jimmy Avocados and Qdoba, we had refreshments available. Chips and queso, cookies and a taco bar! Colorful Crafts and activities were set up around the room, Pearler Bead keychains, Tye dye, rock and mini canvas painting, diy button and patches, and teens could customize canvas totes. The party was a huge success!
- For the month of June, we had a total of 146 teens attend programs! We hosted two events
 each week, each based on a different creative theme. Tuesdays were our high energy creative
 events; Fridays we had Hyper-fixation Club: Craft & Chill (A sensory-friendly program available
 every week.)
- Teens got to:
 - Pick out a free book and roll for a prize at every Tuesday program
 - Earn entries for our epic grand prizes at every program
- The Character Creation & Cosplay Workshop was a huge hit, with 20 attendees! Teens were encouraged to come in full costume! Teen librarians came as a critter, reptilian hybrid, complete with full costume, horns and furry ears! Teens learned character design from start to finish with a short presentation we created on character archetypes, color schemes, and how to bring their big ideas to life! They each got a chance to create their own unique characters through creative writing, storytelling, and illustrations. We taught the basics of closet cosplay, then crafted realistic animal ears, horns, and fantasy leather pouches in a beginner-friendly props session. There were many unique ideas and costumes, and we have many who are interested in doing this again during the school year.

- For Hyper-Fixation Club: Craft and Chill, teens made DIY Fantasy Amulets or Talismans. They were perfect as a cosplay prop, fashion statement, or personal charm. We taught basic wire wrapping, and they designed unique pendants. 14 attendees!
- We hosted a one-shot tabletop role-playing game called *Turf War: Kobold Endeavour*. A Reimagined RPG we designed based on *Kobold Endeavour* by Grant Howitt. The RPG had a gritty, mafia inspired twist, that transformed the original one-page RPG into a high stake's underworld heist! Participants role played as scaly little kobold cronies in a world ruled by dragon crime lords, tasked with a mission to rob a rival's treasure hoard without getting caught, causing distractions and mayhem. They were armed with sketchy tools and boundless greed, to outwit traps, dodge guards, and steal big, with the help of their imaginations and a bit of luck! We had both experienced RPG players and newbies; everyone picked it up quickly. There was plenty of daring and outrageous storytelling! 15 attendees!
- For Hyper-Fixation Club: Craft and Chill, teens participated in a creative worldbuilding and carto graphing activity designing fantasy maps. They used a rice drop method dropping a handful of rice onto their paper to trace an outline, then added landscapes, cities, and other distinguishing features. There was also the option to use a quick game for inspiration for their maps using a D6 to determine the theme, landscape, and time periods of these worlds. The maps were filled with kingdoms, mountains, seas, and secrets! 25 attendees!
- Thanks to the Henry Logan Foundation, we have given away over 80 books to teens who
 attended our Tuesday events. The books are loosely organized and categorized by genre in
 storage.
- Michael has put together two displays for us including Summer-ween, and Magic vs. Science. They look great!
- Graphics for the second half of Summer Library club are made for our events to be put on Facebook, the Library website, other social media platforms, as well as the screens that display upcoming Programs.

Ongoing Projects

- Teen Summer Library Club *Color Our World* has had an amazing start with lots to look forward to in July in conjunction with excited participation and many new families and faces!
- We will continue having two events each week in July, with each week loosely based on a
 different creative theme. We will be able to host a **minimum** of 40 kids a week for these
 programs. Waitlists for these programs have been constant, and we have been doing our best to
 make do with our supplies and staff to include as many as possible who are on the waitlists.
 Every week there will be two main programs:
 - Tuesdays High energy big creative events
 - Fridays Hyper-fixation Club: Craft & Chill (A sensory-friendly program available every week.
- The passive art installation featuring cascading rainbow hearts, where patrons are invited to
 "build the vibe" by writing their names on a rainbow heart continues. Every name added is a
 reminder that everyone matters, everyone belongs, and together we make the world more
 vibrant. As the installation grows, so does the collective expression of celebrating creativity and
 community.
- We have displays throughout the teen area to keep patrons interested in new and trending series/subjects.
- Blind date with a book display continues thanks to Colleen.

In the midst of all this the library continues to be a working library for all ages so they continue to help people print and make copies, address computer queries, send faxes, stamp notaries, and schedule the meeting room for the few days it is available in the month; not to mention clean, check in, and shelve books. Also in June, a great patron of the library passed away. Kristy would personally deliver books to this patron in the nursing home and pick up her returns. In her obituary, the family asked that in lieu of flowers, donations be made to the South Parkersburg Library.
