- Programming for October is set up and will be chock full of fun things. The Crafts will be the Tin Can Owls and Spooky Mirrors. Lawrence Greene will visit in November with insights on the importance of the harvest in culture and possibly some hints on fall foraging. We will be hosting a local author showcase in October, featuring 7 local authors, including our own Jessica Todd. Rachel Dickel will be continuing a four-part series on health management, starting on September 10 and ending in October. Tom Moore will talk about local hauntings and Skeptic Daniel Reed will talk about the traditional Appalachian Ghost Stories.

Completed Projects

- Fall programming is in full swing, and we are excited to get settled into our school year schedule!
- Each week, we hosted two story times for ages birth through three years old. This is definitely our most popular story time, with us averaging about 35 people per week. Becky and I thoroughly enjoy this story time and getting to know the families that attend. We sing a lot of the same songs each week and it is so sweet hearing the kids' sweet little voices sing the songs. It's precious!
- We also have story time for preschool students on Fridays. We can usually read a longer book in this story time, so it is fun watching the kids react to the stories we read!
- Our You Choose Book Club has started up again and has become a staple of our school year
 programming. I can't believe it's already been four years of hosting this book club! We read Can
 You Nab the Mothman, which took us to Point Pleasant on a hunt for Mothman. The ending we
 chose did not lead us to Mothman, but the kids still had fun following the story!
- Camp Half-blood is now on book three of the Percy Jackson series: The Titan's Curse. We have added some new members and now have 9 kids actively participating in the club. I have never read the series, so it has been fun to read along with the kids. Kelsey is our resident mythology expert and always shares cool stories from our book that tie into famous Greek Myths. I've learned a lot from her! We've had the kids annotate as they read, and it's really led to some great discussions!
- Each month, we host a scavenger hunt for kids to enjoy. In honor of Library Card Sign Up Month, we did a scavenger hunt where Pigeon (a famous book character by Mo Willems) lost his card in the library, and the kids had to help him find it. The clues took them around the library and helped kids learn about all the different types of books and materials we have available to check out. When the kids completed the hunt, they got a goody bag that included a library card lanyard, bookmark, stickers and buttons. We had 105 kids complete the scavenger hunt for September!
- Lego Club is another staple of our school year programming. Kids are given a challenge and have to build based on that challenge. This month, they had to build their dream playground. Some kids' playgrounds included swimming pools, chocolate fountains, and more. I am always impressed by the creativity of these kids!
- A new program that we have added is a biweekly homeschool music class. My elementary music teacher, Sandy Laird, leads the class, and it has been a joy working with her! She hosts two classes: one for kindergarten through second grade and a class for third through fifth grade. In September, the kids learned about beat and rhythm.

- We hosted a woodland critter craft event where we read a story, then kids got to make a variety of crafts based on some of our favorite forest friends. This was a new program for us, so we were surprised to have over 40 people in attendance.
- Our furry friends from the Tail Waggin' Tutors were back for our reading with the therapy dogs event. We do this each month, and it is a great opportunity for kids to practice reading out loud in a calm, safe environment. We are grateful to the dog handlers who have helped us host this program since 2017.
- During the last week of September, we hosted a craft event called "Crafty Bookworms Unite". At
 this event, families could visit us anytime throughout the day to make book related crafts. Kids
 got to paint their own book ends, make book page flowers, and decorate their own acrylic
 bookmarks. As book lovers ourselves, Becky and I had a lot of fun planning and prepping for this
 event. We had over 150 people in attendance!
- I had the opportunity to meet with a sales rep from Apple Books to look at materials to order for our collection.

Ongoing Projects

- Researching and ordering books for our children's collection.
- Displaying books throughout the room to keep children interested in new series/subjects. This
 month we did a back-to-school display and later in the month we displayed a variety of fall
 books.
- Creating a monthly calendar to advertise our events for children aged 13 and under.
- Creating graphics for social media to highlight our upcoming events.
- Relabeling and organizing the children's chapter book collection. We have finished labeling
 mystery books and will be moving on to scary stories. This project is taking us longer than
 expected, but we are getting a lot of positive feedback from patrons about how they like the
 new labelling system.
- Each week, Becky reads to a second-grade class at Madison Elementary, and I read to a kindergarten and both first grade classes at Criss Elementary. We both enjoy being at Wood County Schools each week to encourage a love of reading amongst their students!
- Due to the number of participating children and the workload, we have decided to start preparations for our summer program much earlier this year. We have spent the month of September researching program ideas and will meet at the beginning of October to solidify our plans and start prepping the programs. Our theme for next summer is "Unearth a Story", so we will be focusing on archaeology and paleontology for our activities.

Completed Projects

Hyper-fixation Club for teens has begun this school year with great participation. We had three meetings this month with one being Sensory Friendly. Many continuing club members returned, with several new and welcome faces! Teens enjoy this time together to share their interests, work on hobbies, and of course enjoy snacks, and the tea bar. A low-key activity or craft is available on most of the days that members can enjoy. Pearler Beads, DIY buttons and stickers, customizing pencil pouches, embroidery and drawing. - Portal Nook Creations had 15 attend. Teens crafted portals to tiny worlds for their bookshelves.
 Using recycled food boxes, miniatures, moss, wallpapers, and fairy lights. Their creations were very detailed and inventive, with haunted graveyards, enchanted forests, fairy raves, and dream rooms, everything giving... magical and miniature!
- Marionette Mayhem: Puppet Workshop had 11 attend. Teens designed their own marionette puppets based on Albrecht Roser's design of a scarf marionette. They learned the basics of puppet making, designing unique characters, learning how to sting them up (And tie knots) and how to handle the controller to animate their creations. There is an interest in puppeteering, so we might revisit this in the future with another workshop that's more in depth. There were cute puppets, cursed puppets, and some that were in between. Afterwards, for those interested, we filmed a mini clip starring their creations and put together a video compilation.
- Middle Grade Meet up FNAFternoon for ages 10-13 had 11 attend. Themed after the popular video game Five Nights At Freddy's, kids got to stop by to make their own character keychains, design spooky pizza place posters, fold animatronic origami, and show off their trivia skills in a game of Kahoot! All players got to keep custom fandom buttons, and mini Funko Pop collectables.
- Thanks to Colleen the friendship display had 5 book checkouts and approximately 50 bracelets taken by patrons.

Ongoing Projects

- We have displays throughout the teen area to keep patrons interested in new and trending series/subjects.
- Blind date with a Book display continues thanks to Colleen, as well as Protagonists with disabilities and magical schools thanks to Micheal.
- We are creating monthly calendars to advertise our events for teens ages 12 to 19.
- Graphics for programs are made to be put on Facebook, the Library website, other social media platforms, as well as the screens that display upcoming events.
- The Young Adult team hopes to focus on creating a more inclusive space, and that includes neurodivergent youth. We are working on brainstorming more sensory-friendly areas, specialized programs, and tailored support to ensure every teen feels welcome and supported with their unique learning and social needs at the library and in the Teen area.
- The Discord server continues to be popular. We use it to spread the word on upcoming events and programs, and we hope to explore ways to use this resource to encourage engagement with the library in the future, as well as passive/ online events and programs. We have had many new members to the server! This is a safe space where we foster respect, safety, and friendship for teens of all types of backgrounds. Mods are all members of our Youth Services staff!
- Information on joining the Teen library discord server are on flyers that are available to pick up for patrons. These admission slips outline the rules of joining the server. Patrons must be 13 to be added, if they are under 16, they need a guardian's signed permission.
- Plans for Teen Summer Library Club 2026 are in the works!
